Mary Margaret says she is also collecting used clothing and shoes for men, women and children (any sizes). If you are cleaning out closets and have clothing or shoes in very good condition, you can donate those items by bringing them to the March meeting as

well. Any item listed below is still needed and can be purchased for under \$3 at the local discount stores. And don't forget to bring the totes and aprons back if you took material home last month.

We will be packing the Victory Boxes at the Mitchell House after the March meeting and propagation workshop. Mary Margaret will bring the boxes and labels so plan to stay an extra hour to help. She promises this is an easy task!

Victory Boxes are handed out by specially selected United States service personnel to the Iraqi and Afghan people as a show of good will. Many of the people who receive Victory Box items are in orphanages, schools and hospitals that are hardest hit by the conflict. This is an opportunity for our Club to directly help their citizens with practical but not always obtainable goods PLUS it demonstrates to our troops how much support they have at home. We have <u>two</u> \$2,000 Scholarships to award. For some unknown reason it's hard for us to find applicants. Who would have thought it would be that way! Look around. Do you realize how early Easter is this year? As you may know, Easter is always the 1st Sunday after the1st full moon after the Spring Equinox (which is March 20). This dating of Easter is based on the lunar calendar that Hebrew people used to identify Passover, which is why it moves around on our Roman calendar.

Found out a couple of things you might be interested in! Based on the above, Easter can actually be one day earlier (March 22) but that is pretty rare. Here's the interesting info. This year is the

earliest Easter any of us will ever see the rest of our lives! And only the most elderly of our population have ever seen it this early (95 years old or above!). And none of us have ever, or will ever, see it a day earlier! Here's the facts:

The next time Easter will be this early (March 23) will be the year 2228 (220 years from now). The last time it was this early was 1913 (so if you're 95 or older, you are the only ones that were around for that!).

The next time it will be a day earlier, March 22, will be in the year 2285 (277 years from now). The last time it was on March 22 was 1818. So, no one alive today has or will ever see it any earlier than this year!

Important Election Information

Please vote in May to keep the Homestead tax cap for 65 and over, even if you are not 65 yet. A constitutional amendment will be on the ballot at the May election. It is an amendment to correct an error made by the lawmakers when they voted for a reduction in school property taxes in 2005.

When the lawmakers voted for a one-third reduction in school property taxes beginning in 2006 and to be completed this year, they forgot about the homestead exemption for senior citizens and people with disabilities.

The state constitution caps school property taxes for homeowners 65 years and older and those who are disabled. However, they DID NOT get the same reduction when the property tax cut for schools was voted on two years ago. So an amendment is on the May ballot to correct this error.

We would really appreciate your getting the word out to all your friends and families to vote for this amendment. The fear is that with a low voter turnout, the amendment could very well not pass.

So, please, please pass the word and VOTE for the constitutional amendment. Early voting will take place April 30 - May 5 from 7 am to 7 pm; May 6 from noon to 6 pm and May 7 - May 8 from 7 am to 7 pm. Election day is May 12 from 7 am to 7 pm.
