

History of the Grapevine Garden Club

At the GGC general meeting on January 22, 2013, a new publication will be offered, *History of the Grapevine Garden Club 1932 – 2012*. Authored by Joetta King, this 81-page, perfect bound book contains the organization details, names of charter members, and accompanying facts and figures of the accomplishments of the club over the past 80 years. It will be invaluable to new club members and citizens who research city history, as a complement to books from the Grapevine Historical Society. These publications cover small town life and how the community developed during the past 80 years.



The club is selling these books for \$10 each as long as the supply holds out. Joetta will be available at the book display.

The Grapevine Garden Club was formally organized in 1932, and we, the current membership, realized in January of 2012, that we were facing our 80th anniversary. We hardly had time to make plans or even think about that astounding date for we were

heavily involved in hosting the District II Spring Convention and planning the launch of the Greenhouse Project. One member was thinking about it, however. Joetta King, a member for 28 years, knew the time was ripe for recognition of what the club had accomplished in Grapevine. She was familiar with the records stored in the archive room at the Grapevine Public Library. She had studied the scrapbooks, newsletters, and early meeting minutes in her fulfillment of many of the club's offices she had held over the years. She felt in her bones that it was time for 80 years of history to be recapped and brought to light.



"I didn't really intend to write a history," she says now. "It just evolved during the long-range preparation for the September 2012 general meeting program. Our theme, Every Member an Active Member, was an effort to encourage a wider range of membership participation in activities and projects. As I looked backward, I felt great pride in membership! That pride in the club and its accomplishments over 80 years pushed me to give recognition to the many, many wonderful members who have contributed to its success."

As Joetta worked on other GGC projects, the idea of a written history of the club kept her awake many nights. She ran the idea by several other members, and all agreed she was the one to do it. If anyone else wrote the history, it would be Joetta who would review it, so she might as well do it to begin with. The history book project began the winter of 2012.

Did she have any idea it would be such an effort? "NO! The research and writing was enjoyable. The editing process was tedious."

Never having written something so all-encompassing before, Joetta found the research to be enormous and time consuming. She spent hours at the library, poured over city history, and talked to city officials, Historical Society members, GGC members. She finally began to write, always revising when she found additional facts. While Joetta worked on the heart of manuscript, Elayne Vick began the foreword, the introduction, the plans for an index, the cover design, the very end – the defining front and back matter. And the editing went on, again & again. A style guide had to be developed & adhered to.

After a summer spent editing and rewriting, Joetta and Elayne thought they were almost through with the first draft. Then a city employee, Sallie Andrews, cleaned out a storage shed at a dwelling referred to as the Dunn-Barton house in Grapevine. When Carolyn Ernst, president of the Grapevine Historical Society, realized the significance of the ledgers discovered in the house to the club's history, she handed them over to Joetta. After a brief read, Joetta realized what historical gems the journals contained, so there

was nothing to do but stop, read, take careful notes, and decide what needed to be added to the draft. This took more time. A fall deadline passed.

Joetta was determined to recognize by name the club's charter members and succeeding members who worked on early projects. She made long lists of members and dug to get exact names, which was particularly difficult since women went by their husbands' names until the 1970s. Research became tedious in this matter. Joetta was finally able to determine the given name of all but three female charter members and five past presidents. She says, "It may not make a difference that we don't know the given names of these women, but there is a certain bothersome inequity in that."



All of this backtracking and research taxed her patience. She says, "I am still very concerned that I have failed to give sufficient credit to individuals who have contributed to the success of the club."




One example of a GGC Project



Yet what was so astounding to Joetta was the lengthy list of projects, the enormous amount of actual work the members did for the city. And the facts had to be right. If anything, history is a collection of facts, not wishes or maybes. She had a vision of what she wanted the finished product to be: "In reading the history, I hoped that new officers and chairs would have a better understanding of what had been accomplished in the past and give them a feeling of connection as they moved forward in accomplishing future goals of the organization. In addition, I wanted new members to be able to relate to the club's commitment to accomplishing objectives."

Finally, around the first of December, 2012, Joetta met with a committee of members who had provided valuable information and helped proof the drafts. They met to get a clear idea of how long the history would be, the various parts of the book, the acknowledgements, index, appendices, illustrative photos, cover design, number of copies – a list of measurable details. It took another month to clear up everything and deliver it to the printer. Printed copies will be available at the January 22 general meeting. Members insist that Joetta be stationed where the books are sold (for \$10 each)

so she can comply with every request to sign a book. She is embarrassed by this, but it is

Bird Sanctuary Week in Grapevine

Proclamation

Grapevine's City Council will be issuing a proclamation declaring the last week of January 2013 as Bird Sanctuary Week. Although activities of the club related to the protection of wild birds have included continuous projects since its inception, it wasn't until 1981 that the GGC sponsored an ordinance for the protection of wild bird life. The City Council approved Resolution 81–19 on July 7, 1981, providing that the stated policy of the City of Grapevine is to support and enforce the State laws contained in the Parks and Wildlife Code relating to the conservation of bird life. Proclamations were signed in 1981 by William D. Tate, Mayor of the City of Grapevine, and in 1986 by Tom Powers, Mayor of the City of Grapevine, proclaiming the last week in January as Bird Sanctuary Week. Among other things, this proclamation states that the city encourages all citizens of Grapevine to conserve birdlife through care, feeding, and protection from danger.

Library program – Saturday, January 26th, 2:00 P.M.

Bird Sanctuary Week activities will include a kickoff program sponsored by the GGC, *Giving CPR to the Birds through Habitat Protection*, by Dr. Ray Chancellor at the Grapevine Public Library on Saturday, January 26 at 2:00 P.M. Dr. Chancellor will discuss birds of the local area and how important the protected habitat of the backyard and community open land is both to their global survival and local ecology. It will also be a wonderful time to learn how to make your backyard wildlife friendly. He will share his personal photographs that have been taken over the last 40 years in the local ecosystem and in his own backyard.

Dr. Chancellor is an educator, naturalist, photographer, painter, and an environmentalist with a special interest in the Eastern Cross Timbers where he has lived and studied for many years. He is past president of both the Central Texas Audubon Society and the Central Texas Astronomical Society. Currently, he is actively involved with the the Southlake Cove Ornithological Society and its efforts to preserve the local area's wonderful natural history heritage and ecosystem.



Many members had the privilege of attending the tour of Ray and Dinah Chancellor's garden in June 2010. It was a wonderful opportunity to observe how to create a landscape that includes all kinds of elements and plants, providing food, water and shelter for bird habitats.

Gardeners on the Go – Tuesday, January 29 8:00 A.M. – 3:00 P.M. Hagerman National Wildlife Refuge (HNWR)

Adults only – Contact Joetta King for tour reservation.

Consider joining this tour to view the winter birds at HNWR, a haven for migratory birds and other wildlife. HNWR lies north of Whitesboro on the Big Mineral Arm of Lake Texoma. The refuge is made up of water, marsh and an upland habitat which is home to over 338 recorded species of birds. The main focus at HNWR is to provide a winter home for thousands of waterfowl. Foremost among these are Canadian geese. Starting in November, geese by the thousands arrive at the refuge. Geese sighted may include white fronted and snow geese, with a scattering of the smaller Ross's geese. By late February, both grain and geese are gone. So, we are hoping that our guided tour on January 29 will allow ample viewing of the winter birds! Our visit at the refuge will be from 10 A.M. to noon and will include a one-hour introduction to the refuge in the visitors' center and a one-hour guided driving tour on the 2-mile Wildlife Drive, which travels by farm fields and wetlands. The 8:00 A.M. – 3:00 P.M. time frame includes a lunch stop which of course would be optional.

PROCLAMATION

WHEREAS, the City of Grapevine recognizes the value of birds as an important natural resource that furnishes the citizens and the City economic benefits and values as a first line of defense against noxious weeds and insects that destroy landscaping and crops; and

WHEREAS, the City has supported bird life conservation for over 30 years; and:

WHEREAS, on July 7, 1981 the Grapevine City Council approved Resolution No. 81-19 for the protection of wild bird life and;

WHEREAS, the resolution provides that the stated policy of the City of Grapevine is to support and enforce the State laws contained in the Parks and Wildlife Code relating to the conservation of bird life.

NOW, THEREFORE, 1, William D. Tate, Mayor of the City of Grapevine, Texas along with the City Council, residents and, City Staff do hereby proclaim the week of January 27 - February 2, 2013 as

"BIRD SANCTUARY WEEK"

and encourage all Grapevine citizens to conserve bird life through care, feeding and protection from danger.

Create a Bird Sanctuary and You'll Never Be Bored!

My husband used to "suggest" to me that our yard had enough native American Beautyberry shrubs in it, but this past November, after watching the robins and cardinals enjoy the bountiful harvest of berries, he has changed his mind. We have been constantly entertained by a whirlwind of bird activity in our certified Backyard Habitat. These berryloving birds have cleaned our native American Beautyberry shrubs of all berries, and have managed to put on a comedic show at the birdbath and fountain. I think the berries must have fermented on the shrubs, as the birds became a bit "goofy" while eating and swimming in the birdbath and fountain!

Watching birds enjoy your yard is only one great reason to create a bird sanctuary and to have a certified Backyard Habitat. Many of you already have all the requirements in your gardens to qualify for a National Wildlife Federation Backyard Habitat <u>and</u> aTexas Parks Wildscape. These requirements are few: provide food, shelter, and water. So, what's keeping you from getting your garden certified??!! Let me know when your garden becomes certified!

To see the complete habitat requirements and certification details, visit both websites at www.nwf.org/backyardwildlifehabitat and www.tpwd.state.tx.us/wildscape (put your computer cursor on the websites above and hold down the CTRL key).

Certification will require —

- At least 50% native plants.
- Food for the wildlife year round. A feeder alone will not be considered, but if at any time there is not food available for the wildlife from plants, a feeder would then be required.
- Shelter for the wildlife. This might include various plant features, should include plants in each category—tall trees, understory, shrubs, bushes and wildflowers; may include nest boxes, brush piles, rock piles, toad houses and other shelter projects.
- Water in a useable, reliable form for the wildlife.

Wildscapes certification fee is \$15.00.

To become certified as a Texas Wildscape, complete the <u>Texas Wildscapes Backyard Habitat Application</u> and mail it with the certification fee to—

Your participation as a hummer watcher will help TPWD to determine more about range, distribution, favored sites, and feeding habits of hummingbirds. The survey is also a way to share information about their natural history.

The training will be conducted by **Mark Klym**, coordinator of the Texas Hummingbird Roundup and Texas Wildscapes programs at the Texas Parks and Wildlife department. A Perfect Example of a Real Volunteer

According to Mary Jo Tellin, Keep Grapevine Beautiful (KGVB) Executive Director and GGC member, Marion Brekken is the perfect example of a real volunteer. In recognition of over 20 years of contributing to a greener, cleaner Grapevine, Marion was recently honored by KGVB with a Lifetime Achievement Award. In describing Marion's contribution over the last 20 years, Tellin wrote that her "style and grace has bestowed knowledge and insight into all the decisions that had to be made to further volunteerism in Grapevine. She has always spoken out on what she believes in, always noticed the fine points that made a difference, and has volunteered in nearly all capacities in all types of weather. Her intuitiveness is always right on the money."



GGC member Marion Brekken was instrumental in organizing a group of concerned citizens to form the Grapevine Beautification Committee to clean up city roadsides, medians, and the Grapevine Lake area in 1992. After meeting with PARD representative Joe Moore for several years, the group was certified by Keep America Beautiful and the name was changed to Keep Grapevine Beautiful. In 2005 KGVB was incorporated and became an official 501c3 non-profit organization. It is a volunteer organization dedicated to a clean, litter-free, and beautiful Grapevine. Programs include waterway and park clean ups, recycling events, park renovation, and beautification projects. Mary Jo Tellin was officially appointed as KGVB Executive Director in 2008.

The connection between KGVB and GGC has continued through the years and most recently involved three projects.

We partnered to start Grapevine's first ever community gardens project in 2009. A garden established at GRACE helps fill the food pantry with fresh produce for clients. A second project involved establishing community gardening plots at the Heritage community garden on the property of Heritage United Methodist Church. A percentage of the production at the community garden is donated to GRACE. In addition to donating \$400 toward purchasing a storage shed, GGC members donated garden tools and supplies for the project and served as consultants on vegetable gardening.

The club participated in a project with Keep Grapevine Beautiful in 2012 to improve the 100 foot frontage area at Fire Station #2 located at 2801 Panhandle Drive and Dove Road. GGC members helped develop a landscape plan, purchase plants, and direct the planting efforts of the volunteer group. In addition, \$200 was donated toward purchasing plants for the project.

Liberty Park, location for the Torian Cabin, was a major landscape beautification project for GGC in 1998-1990. But only a few of the plants survived the changes the city made in later years, and due to a lack of proper maintenance, the Liberty Park landscape became unsightly. The area also needed to accommodate festival activities. Inspired by Get Growing National Planting Day, an initiative of Keep America Beautiful, KGVB volunteers in the fall of 2012, cleared the beds of overgrown plants, prepared soil for planting, and installed a design created by Lisa Adams Grove, City Horticulturist and GGC member. Paula Wilbanks and Pam Braak, also members, worked as team leaders under the direction of Mary Jo Tellin. It was encouraging to see that some of the plants such as the Texas persimmon survived as a reminder of GGC members' hard work in completing the original landscape project.

GGC members are well aware of Marion's contributions to the community as she has been of service to our club for 31 years! The following is a list of years of her service as an officer and a chair, but it does not reflect her service as a committee member or volunteer at other activities such as the plant sale and Arbor Day programs.
