Another GGC donation helped to provide two new beds of native perennials near the front entrance to Grapevine Elementary School. This project is co-sponsored by the PTA Environmental Committee and helped to provide plants such as Autumn Sage, Blackfoot Daisies, Zexmenia, Mexican Feather Grass, Fall Asters, Lantana, and Skullcap. The Grapevine Garden Club also gave each of these school representatives their choice of some plants remaining from the annual plant sale.

The garden is a cooperative effort between the Tarrant County Master Gardener Association and the Heritage Elementary PTA. The Master Gardeners maintain the garden on a weekly basis year-round and organize a monthly Garden Club for second through fifth graders with the PTA liaisons. The students learn about planting, harvesting, composting, seeds, bees, butterflies, other insects and the environment. The Black Swallowtail caterpillars munching on fennel plants provide a hot topic in the garden right now.

Getting Your Garden to Flutter!

If you attended the butterfly seminar by Barbara Atkins and perused all the plants that attract butterflies at the plant sale, you were hopefully inspired to incorporate some of these plants into your garden. "Butterflies and caterpillars add such beauty and interest to a garden. It is important to provide native and adapted plants to provide food and nectar to a vital part of our outdoor ecosystem. And besides it is just fun to see the butterflies float by on a breeze!" stated President, Karen Rice.

Butterfly plants provide nectar and serve as larval hosts for butterflies. Geyata Ajilvsgi, author of *Butterfly Gardening for the South*, wrote "Butterflies are like people. They gravitate to where they have food." Most colorful plants attract their attention for nectar; but purple, red, orange, yellow and white blossoms are their favorites. Butterflies will come into the garden for nectar if you supply them with flowers. But if you want to *keep* them in the garden, consider providing plants for the caterpillar stage of their life cycle. Caterpillars, also called larvae, feed mostly on the foliage of garden plants. You have to accept the fact that butterflies begin their life cycles as larvae, and there will be foliage damage.

Why are we concerned? Milkweeds and nectar sources for butterflies are declining due to development and use of herbicides.

Barbara Munn has incorporated coreopsis, poppies, lace vine, verbena, larkspur, roses, salvia and milkweed in her butterfly garden. She commented, "As a beginning gardener, one year I accidently planted seeds that attracted both butterflies and bees. It was so much fun watching them. I then purposely wanted to be a part of their life cycle, both to enjoy the process and to teach my grandchildren about their beauty and purpose."

Because of the loss of natural areas in our community, it is becoming necessary for residents to provide nesting and habitat areas for all wildlife, birds, and butterflies. Dinah Chancellor stated, "Becoming a certified National Wildlife Federation Habitat Site was important to Ray and me because of our desire to share our lives with the natural world. The seasons of the year mark endless cycles of comings and goings as wildlife exit nesting grounds, travel to winter habitats, feast on available nutrition, and become strong enough to migrate home to procreate—

thus guaranteeing the survival of their species. We want to be a part of this endless, miraculous cycle. Every handful of seed, every plant, every water source, every thicket and brush pile has the fulfilling and satisfying purpose of nurturing the relationship between our existence and the natural world."

Suzi Guckel's garden is certified both as a Backyard Wildlife Habitat as well as a Butterfly Habitat. She indicated, "By applying for these two certificates, I have two visible signs of designation to remind me to be ever mindful of my surroundings. By doing this, I remember to plant for the butterflies, bees, and other beneficial insects. It makes for a healthier world, one yard at a time."

"We just started our butterfly garden early last spring, so it's very new. It's still a work in progress. We are still learning. We appreciate nature and believe it's important to help even if it's in a small way. It was amazing to watch all the color from the flowers, but mostly the different types of butterflies," stated Sharon Beach.

According to GGC membership records, there are only 14 members registered as National and/or Texas Backyard Wildlife Habitats and 9 members registered as Butterfly Habitats/ Monarch Waystations. Surely there are more. Did you let the membership chair know that you have a registered habitat? We can do better! Consider participating!

Texas Native Butterflies with Dale Clark

Dale is the founder of the Dallas Lepidopterist Society established in 1995. Its purpose is to provide a forum where people may gather to share an interest in butterflies and moths, whether that interest takes the form of collecting, gardening, photography, study or casual observation. Learn about the life cycle and behaviors of some of our common butterflies and see how easy it is to attract them to your own yard. Dallas County and surrounding counties have over 170 species of butterflies recorded for the area.



An early vision of gardens in America started with practical ideas.

Joetta King's recently published history of the Grapevine Garden Club begins with how garden clubs in America came to be organized. She writes how civic restoration and improvement was accomplished many years before formal organization. A new book recently published by Smithsonian Books traces this same path and goes into great depth about the women who fought billboards, urban blight, prostitution, tuberculosis, plus helped feed the U.S. Army in World War I by canning produce from private gardens. Their organization helped alleviate Europe's seed shortage during World War II, advocated for wild horses in the American West, collaborated with the Sierra Club to block nuclear power plants, and helped save the Big Thicket in deep East Texas and the giant redwoods on the West coast.



A recent review of this new book states: "The legacy, the Garden Club of America, celebrates its 100th birthday on May 1. To commemorate the occasion, the Smithsonian Institution has published *The Garden Club of America: 100 Years of a Growing Legacy* [Smithsonian Books, \$29.95]. The author, William Seale, is a historian and part-time Houston resident. This account is thorough and scholarly, yet lyrical."

Seale makes some interesting points in his book. He says it is hard to imagine a time when gardening was endangered, but historically, despite the nation's romance with the outdoors, science was not up to date on nature. In the midnineteenth century, many believed that flowers ejected poisonous vapors and thus, fresh flower arrangements were not common in homes, despite what movies and dramas depicting that era show.

The club had good reason to form a conservation committee to rescue native plants and thus protect them by law. The club eventually drifted to quieter pursuits. Seals explains how flower arranging competitions have furthered the concept of the practice as an intellectual exercise that creates "temporary art." This could be the origin of Texas Garden Clubs Inc.'s Flowercade. How far we've come!

Grapevine Botanical Gardens Greenhouse Progress Report

The Grapevine Garden Club has partnered with the city of Grapevine to raise money for a greenhouse to be built in the Grapevine Botanical Gardens. To date, the Greenhouse Project has received donations in excess of \$43,000.00. This report is to inform our membership in more detail about this fundraising effort.

FROM WHOM do you request donations? The majority of donations still come from the Grapevine Garden Club, Inc., individual members, local businesses and service organizations. Committee members continue to solicit donations with personal one-on-one conversations to explain how a greenhouse will benefit their

family and the community. They challenge the individual to match their own contribution and accept pledges for future donations. Our current pledges total \$3,000.00.

WHY CONTRIBUTE? The Club, members, businesses, and individuals believe in the Greenhouse Project and know their donation will be used wisely. They understand the value of educating youth, adults and seniors about the environment and conservation. They enjoy the Botanical Gardens and appreciate the garden staff and volunteers. They know their donation is tax deductible. And they are generous, conscientious individuals who are unable to volunteer so they support the project with a donation.


WHAT does the club do? Applications for grants have been submitted to foundations and businesses. Over the past year, the project team and club have worked hard on several promotional and fundraising events. We distribute information every chance we get – Earth Day Booth, district garden club meetings, the public library, events sponsored by the Grapevine Convention and Visitors Bureau (CVB) and Parks and Recreation Department (PARD), on websites and in news articles. We offered to-go box lunches from a local restaurant for members to buy after monthly meetings. Since January, the same restaurant also returns 15% of the total meal ticket each time a guest eats at the restaurant and mentions the Greenhouse Project. In October, the Grapevine PARD sponsored a plant sale and all profits went to the greenhouse project.

Matching grants have provided additional funds. We offer free tours in the botanical gardens which often result in a donation. We created a "Greenhouse Trail" with colorful informational signs. The trail leads to the future location of the greenhouse in the Gardens.



WHAT now? Upcoming events include working with the CVB and getting paid to greet guests during Grapevine's Main Street Days in May. Grapevine PARD is also helping to sponsor the Native Tree and Shrub Sale during the Butterfly Flutterby festival in October. The \$150,000 goal is still out there to be raised, but we continue to be out there, too! The Grapevine Garden club will continue to make every effort to meet that goal.




