

Following the October meeting, you will be visiting the Grapevine gardens of Ed and Joetta King, Joe and Iasmin Friedheim, and Jim and Ann Fuller. Each garden is very different.

Iasmin's goal was to create a backyard landscape that gives the feeling of being at a tropical resort. The Friedheims enjoy entertaining and there are multiple seating areas surrounding the swimming pool. While Iasmin enjoys cooking and gardening, Joe, an engineer, enjoys building. The development of this garden has definitely been a hands-on project by the Friedheims!

While the Fullers have resisted significant additions to their landscape as this is not their permanent residence, Ann has enjoyed enhancing the existing garden and will welcome your suggestions for additions to update her flowerbed – a work in progress. You will have an opportunity to see the interior of the public areas of their home which is currently decorated for a Witch's Party, an annual event for ladies of the neighborhood.

After working on their garden since 1984, you would think Joetta would be finished! But as Suzi Guckel has stated, "My plants need to have wheels" or as Iasmin suggested, "My plants need legs." Gardeners will observe a plant that was planted in what was thought to be the perfect sun or shade exposure and is now declining. Out comes the shovel! And a search for a new location for the plant. (Or, in Val Reed's case possibly a trip to the garbage can. No second chances in the Reed garden!) Throughout the Kings' garden, the plants are identified with plant labels. In addition to the botanical and common name, Joetta may have noted the year it was planted and when applicable the name of the person who gave her the plant. Ed worked for IBM which was sometimes referred to as 'I've Been Moved' company. The plant labels in the King garden should probably be labeled IBM and the transplanted year or years! Always in transition. Probably the most interesting aspect of this garden – no lawn!

# Plant a Texas Native in the Fall Plant Native – Plant Now October 19, 9 am-1 pm

Gardeners can hardly wait until spring to plant something, but experienced gardeners know that fall is an ideal time for planting many trees, shrubs and flowers. GGC kickoff for Texas Native Plant Week, October 20-26, will be the *Plant Native – Plant Now* plant sale on October 19, 9 am-1 pm at the Grapevine Botanical Gardens, 411 Ball Street.

Why is fall the best time to plant? Cooler temperatures will allow the root systems to get established giving the plant a head start in the spring. The air temperatures may be dropping, but soil temperatures remain warm. In addition, there is generally more rainfall in the fall. You will be giving your plant an opportunity for root growth before the stress of hot summer temperatures. However, not all plants will survive harsh winters, so fall planting isn't for 'winter tender' plants.

If you have a plant in your landscape that has succumbed to the summer drought and water restrictions, consider the adapted and native plants available at *Plant Native – Plant Now*. Look for a fenced area with lots of plants at the south side of the Botanical Gardens! A 10% discount will be offered to GGC members. A selection of trees, shrubs and perennials will be available in 1 gallon sizes – convenient for hauling and planting! Some of the drought tolerant varieties that our Sept. program speaker, Roger Sanderson, spoke about will be available. Come early for best selection and stay and take part in the many Butterfly Flutterby activities.

Lisa Adams Grove and Karen Rice have been shopping for plants that will offer good planting options for your landscape. Consider your sunlight, soil conditions, desired mature height and width needed. A complete list of plants will be emailed to members just prior to the sale that you will want to study. Here is a small sample: Trees – Roughleaf Dogwood, Southern Red Oak, Lacey Oak, Burr Oak, Carolina Buckthorn, Mountain Laurel, Celeste Fig, Blackgum, Mexican Buckeye, Bubba Desert Willow; Shrubs – Prairie Flameleaf Sumac, Butterfly bush, Texas sage (Green Cloud and Lynn's Everblooming); Perennials – Butterfly Weed (the native Asclepias Tuberosa), Chocolate Flower, Mexican Mint Marigold, Zexmenia, Black Foot Daisy, Fall Aster, Greg's Blue Mist.

President Pam Braak's theme for her term is *Welcoming Butterflies to Our Gardens*, and the plant sale will feature butterfly nectar and hosts plants as we endeavor to develop wildlife/butterfly habitats as part of our residential landscapes.

You may also want to check out the *Texas Tree Planting Guide* website provided by Texas A&M Forest Service, and complete the *Custom Tree Selector* form. You will find several options from which to specify desired attributes. This is an easy way to find a list of native trees that will thrive in your location.

Grapevine residents may register for the Grapevine Tree Sharing Program during the sale. Sample trees will be available to view and order. Prices associated with the Grapevine Tree Sharing Program are very reasonable! The purchase of up to two 30-gallon trees includes delivery, planting and a six month – one time – warranty. Trees may be planted in the front or back yard following specific guidelines. Since many of our members are not Grapevine residents, GGC members in the following cities may participate at a higher but still great price: Bedford, Southlake, Colleyville, Euless, Trophy Club, Hurst, North Richland Hills, Coppell, Keller, and Westlake.

The proceeds from the plant sale will benefit the Grapevine Botanical Gardens Greenhouse Fund. *Plant Native-Plant Now* is a cooperative effort with Grapevine Parks and Recreation Department. Please support our efforts by buying plants and volunteering! For further information, contact Chuck Voelker, *Plant Native-Plant Now* coordinator (Yearbook page A-63).




# Calling All Butterfly Enthusiasts

### Monarch program at the Grapevine Library - A Hit!

More than 40 people, including children, attended a program by Jenny Singleton, an educator, Monarch Watch volunteer, seasoned butterfly tag wrangler, and GGC member, on the monarch butterfly at the Grapevine Public Library on Saturday, Sept. 28. Attendees learned about the program from newspapers, GGC website/newsletter/meeting, other websites, Neil Sperry egardens, Dove Elementary School announcement, and library publicity.

Jenny's presentation was especially important, as monarch butterfly populations are in a steady decline due to loss of habitat and the ongoing drought in their migratory path through Grapevine. She showed beautiful photos of the entire life of the monarch and a video of their fall migration, which takes them to an old and endangered pine forest south of Mexico City. Jenny joined a tour several years ago to this area, and she told about this fabulous trip.

In preparation of this program, Jenny looked for and and found milkweed with monarch eggs and caterpillars on it. She cut stems of the plant where she found eggs and caterpillars and brought them home. She told the group:

"I've discovered that milkweed needs to be cut while the stems are under water similar to the way roses are cut. This seems to allow the cut end to continue to absorb the water and not have their cells at the bottom sealed off. This way the stems continue absorbing water and remain rigid for caterpillars to feed on."

Jenny also says if you find a female monarch laying eggs on milkweed, cut off those branches and bring them inside to place in a vase or jar of water. When the eggs hatch, she puts the entire branch in a plastic container with porous lid to let them eat and grow. "There are a lot of predators out

there that enjoy the newly hatched eggs - wasps, ants, and even lady bugs. Their beautiful colors of yellow, black and white attract birds also, who love them as treats."

Jenny brought a container of monarch caterpillars munching on milkweed to the library Saturday for all children to see. This was a star attraction.

What a great preparation for Butterly Flutterby!


