The Grapevine Garden Club Scholarship Committee reviewed thirteen applications and selected four recipients, each one to receive a \$2,500 scholarship for the 2016-2017 academic year.

Miranda Fatum, daughter of Russ and Gail Fatum, graduated from Grapevine High School in 2014. Miranda will soon complete her sophomore year at University of North Texas in Denton. This is her third year to be selected as a scholarship recipient. Miranda's major is Ecology for Environmental Science. She was an active member of the Ecology Club in high school, and at UNT volunteers with the Environmental Discovery and Adventure program. She states she has always been interested in conserving and protecting plants and animals. Miranda's goal is to become a wildlife biologist, teaching others how to protect native plants and animals and participating in conservation efforts.

Ashton Bisballe, daughter of Jeff and Jennifer Bisballe of Grapevine, will be a 2016 graduate from Grapevine High School. She will be attending Tarleton State University and plans to major in Agriculture Education. She has participated in a diverse program with FFA, everything from raising lambs to being on the floriculture team. She has been able to include many agriculture courses in her high school curriculum, including floral design, ecology, and principles of

managing resources. It's not surprising that her goal is to become a high school Agriculture teacher where she can share her knowledge of horticulture and agricultural studies. She also hopes to coach a floriculture team.

Amy Lambert is the daughter of Henry and Rachel Lambert from Colleyville. She will be a 2016 graduate from Grapevine High School. She plans to attend Louisiana State University and major in Environmental Management. She has an interest and passion in the preserving of the wetlands in Louisiana, possibly by the use of native vegetation. Some of her honors include being a certified level one florist in the Texas Floral Association and one of highest scoring members in the FFA Floriculture Team contests.

Scholarships

Wetlands—A Childhood Concern Becomes a Lifelong Passion

Louisiana loses a football field of land every hour. That's over 2,000 square miles since the 1930s! It has been called the fastest disappearing land mass on the face of the earth. The reason for this loss is complex, but much of it is due to the thousands of pipeline canals cut into the marsh by oil companies over the past seventy-plus years. These cuts permit salt water into the marsh which kills the vegetation and allows erosion to take over. Vast miles of marsh have been converted to simply open gulf. This change eliminates many freshwater estuaries that contribute to growing a large variety of seafood. Sixty-six percent of all gulf seafood comes through Louisiana including shrimp, blue crab, oysters, tuna, red-snapper, drums, catfish and crawfish. If you love seafood, the health of Louisiana's wetlands should be very important to you.

A second reason for the loss is that the barrier islands are disappearing due to hurricanes. These islands protect the marsh. Marshes absorb the tidal surges during a hurricane which therefore protects the towns and cities from flooding. The storm surge from Hurricane Rita in 2005, which hit the Texas/Louisiana border, came inland over fifteen miles of marsh. My family saw sugar cane dying in the fields from salt water near my grandma's house for the first time ever.

Why should this epidemic be important to you since you live in Texas not Louisiana? Well, when you are planting your garden and tending to your lawn, does it matter if your neighbor is a lazy gardener and has a bunch of dandelions and crab-grass in his yard? Will your neighbor's yard affect your yard? Of course it will!!! Your neighbor's yard and environment affects your yard and environment. The same is true with neighboring states! What happens in Louisiana can happen to Texas. Hurricanes such as Rita can make landfall anywhere along the gulf coast and people need to know how to reduce the damage as much as possible. One of the most practical proposals is vegetative planting, which places native plants in threatened systems and allows the root systems to form a more solid basis for soil.

Gardener Highlight – Diane Cauwels

No matter how many times you visit a member's garden, there is always something new to see. Diane and Mark Cauwels' Grapevine garden has been on Gardens on View numerous times, and it was recently included in the Promenade Garden Tour where it was described as "the outdoor masterpiece of Diane Cauwels." You would think from the extensive plantings that it was maintained by a crew of gardeners. No! Diane, a recently certified Master Gardener, created the landscape design, selected and installed the plants, and does all the maintenance. In addition, she acted as general contractor for the construction of the stone retaining wall and steps to access the lower backyard garden. Diane enjoys sharing her gardening experience with others and is available for design and consultation for the do-it-yourself gardener. She has been a GGC member for twelve years.

Diane's focus on selecting perennials that will thrive in shady spots and those suitable for sun is impressive. Strategically placed sitting areas invite you to linger and enjoy the seasonal blooms, contrasting foliage texture and shape, and unique garden art. Of all the beautiful plants seen during Promenade, the eye-catching bear's breech (Acanthus mollis) with its shiny darkgreen leaves and striking 3-foot tall bloom stalks of white flowers clasped by purple seemed to generate the most inquiries – possibly because it is not commonly used in Texas gardens nor listed in regional books. Complementing the purple in the bicolor Acanthus bloom, purple-leafed Oxalis triangularis was planted nearby. Both plants were thriving in the Cauwels' garden and should be considered for your shade garden.

In addition to the dramatic impact of Acanthus, the other plant that impressed me was the colorfully patterned and velvety foliage of the Jurassic variegated begonia. Used in a container shaded by an arbor, it inspired me to not only rely on bloom for color but to incorporate more plants with unique foliage in my landscape.


Brugmansia

Diane has successfully planned for a succession of bloom. She takes delight in the spring-blooming Texas Mountain Laurel (Sophora secundiflora) with its violet, wisteria-like flowers that have a grape Nehi scent. Diane commented that although it is considered a little tender in our area, it has done well in her garden for twelve years.

While early spring blooms may have passed their peak, Diane's garden is now enjoying the riveting display of Brugmansia with its voluminous tubular peach flowers draping from the shrub along with other summerblooming perennials. Diane stores the Brugmansia in the garage every winter as it is considered tropical in our area and might not survive outside.




