Fields of Natives to Fields of Tulips

Cultivating native plants in home landscapes brings benefits to the ecology as natives reduce the need to irrigate and fertilize as well as providing food source for wildlife. However, gardeners are also intrigued by growing exotics. This tour is a study in contrast as to what can be grown in Texas.

Trained Master Naturalists from the Elm Fork Chapter of the Texas Master Naturalist program will guide our group on a hike at **Clear Creek Natural Heritage Area**, one of Denton's beautiful hidden natural areas. The area is covered with lush ash, willow and cottonwood forests and includes a wetlands area pond. Nestled in the lowlands, the Clear Creek preserve is a wonderful riparian area along the Clear Creek and Elm Fork of the Trinity River just a few miles from Denton's historic town square. The preserve has a diversity of plant life, 200 species of birds, and signs of wildlife abound. Hike will be on soft surface paths. If you enjoy being outdoors and have an interest in nature, plan on joining the hike.

Having worked up an appetite, build up your energy for picking tulips and photographing fields of tulips by enjoying your packed lunch in the picnic area at **Texas Tulips**. To learn the story of how Pieter Koeman used his family's experience of growing tulips in Holland to establish a tulip farm in the gentle rolling hills

near Pilot Point, go to www.texas-tulips.com. You will find it is pretty amazing to walk in a field of thousands of tulips—and you can pick them! The tulips will be wrapped and stems covered with a special gel to preserve them as long as possible (U-pick – \$2.50 a stem). There are 40 varieties of unique tulips from which to select.

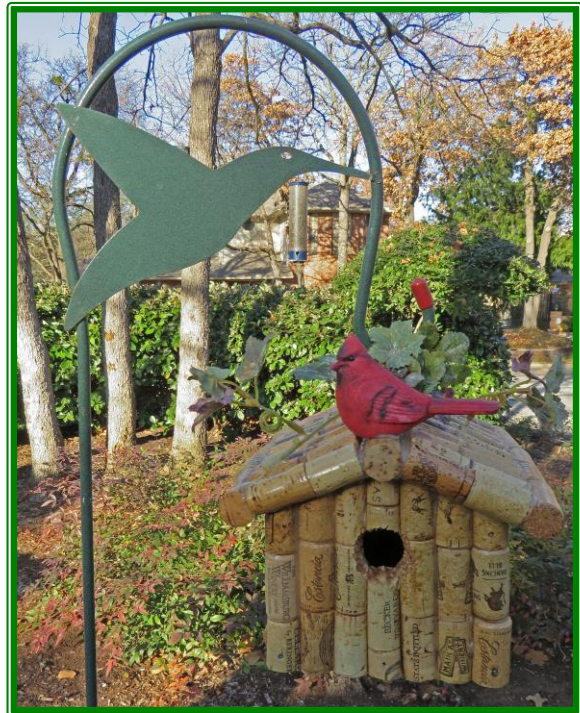

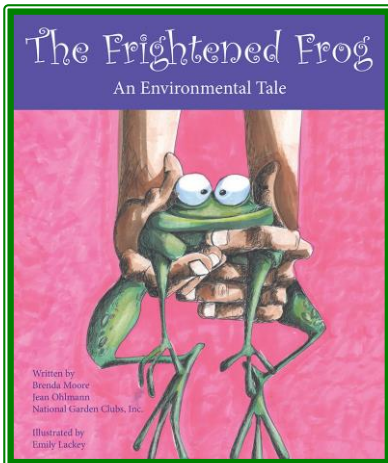
Achieving GGC objectives through donations

The National Garden Clubs, Inc. (a GGC affiliate) published *The Frightened Frog* which is an early reader (K-4) written to educate elementary children about the environmental issues affecting amphibians. It includes Fun Frog Facts, a story describing the challenges of being a frog, and ways children can Leap Into Action to help protect, preserve and support frog and amphibian habitats in their own backyards!



GGC purchased 14 copies of *The Frightened Frog* to give to every elementary school library associated with Grapevine Colleyville ISD, private/church schools located within Grapevine, and the Grapevine Public Library. As stated by NGC, we have a pivotal role in the experiences of the future stewards of the natural world. How much do you know about frogs and amphibians? About the world they live in? We hope that the children will take a journey of learning about frogs, amphibians and their habitat!

A few fun frog facts:

-  Albino frogs are a fairly common occurrence.
-  In Japan, frogs are symbols of Good Luck!
-  Frogs in the environment are a true sign of a well-balanced ecosystem.
-  Frogs completely shed their skin about once a week and they usually eat it!

Searching for Maples and Natives

Tuesday, April 5 – 8:50am-1:00pm

Metro Maples (Kennedale) and Weston Gardens in Bloom (Fort Worth)

Metro Maples is in its 21st year as a quality grower of Japanese and Shantung maples. It began as the dream of Keith Johansson, and now there is an inventory of over 15,000 trees on 6 acres. Over 100 varieties of Japanese maples and shade tree maples like the Shantung and paperbark maple are available in 1 gallon to 45 gallon plants. During our tour on April 5, we should see colorful foliage of the maples as well as colorful azaleas blooming.



Metro Maples is now owned by Scott Hubble – grafter, salesman, yard man, hose dragger, web updater, bookkeeper, etc. Scott wrote, “My ideal garden has mainly azaleas, rhododendrons, and Japanese maples under a canopy of large Shantung maples. (I do not want to garden in Texas in the hot sun so shade trees are essential.) These four basic plants all require similar watering schedules and

soils and are very low maintenance and look great together. I get tremendous spring and fall color. In summer I like only the quiet whispering of trees so I do not plant annuals.” For further information on growing Japanese maples in hot climates, Scott offers further advice on www.metromaples.com. Check out the *Maples on the Move* segment for outstanding photos of maples that will entice you to buy. The notation accompanying photographs from April 21, 2015 made me smile – *A nice young man from the Texas Agricultural Department came out for an inspection. He didn't find any parasites but did cite the farm as paradise.* Join us in Metro Maples paradise on April 5 and visit with Scott Hubble as you shop!

Weston Gardens is the handiwork of Randy and Sue Weston who specialize in creating gardens using native Texas flora and acclimated plants appropriate for our area but with an English flair. As described by Lana Robinson in a *Texas Neighbors* article, “They create English Gardens with a Texas Twang!”

Weston Gardens includes a retail landscape nursery, a small gift shop, and a demonstration garden boasting native and perennial plants. When the Westons opened their landscape nursery in 1984, they were unaware of the secluded area of

what once was a beautiful garden across the street along Chambers Creek. They purchased 10 acres of the old Leon and Peggy Bandy estate in 1988 and began restoration and renewal of the Bandy's "Dripping Springs" retreat.

The historical demonstration garden, known as the "Westonian", with its labeled Texas flora and highly-acclimated plants allows the visitor to evaluate the mature growth habit of plants that may be purchased for your garden. The Westons wrote, "Foremost, we want to demonstrate low-maintenance, yet beautiful, settings that can be achieved by each and every gardener."

“Kiss a Frog and Save a Prince”

In a message from NGC President Sandra H. Robinson, she stated “pollinators and amphibians are like ‘canaries in the coal mine’ crying out a warning that all is not well. We need to heed their cry before our environment and food sources are severely threatened through the loss of these vital species. Each has been challenged by environmental factors - some imposed by nature, and some by human beings. In order to reverse these trends, we must step in and actively create the attitudes, environments and habitats which will nurture healthy populations.” The ***“Kiss a Frog and Save a Prince”*** Director’s Commendation Award is my response to this situation.



The Director’s Commendation Award is recognition for a Club or individual member who establishes or improves their habitats for bee and butterfly pollinators OR provides education to the public about pollinators and amphibian’s environmental threats. If we can improve enough habitats and educate the public about the environment, then maybe by 2017 we will have kissed enough frogs to save our wildlife habitats.

To receive the Director’s Commendation Award, follow the steps below, and then complete the Award form included with this newsletter. Mail completed form to Linda Krimm, 6949 Hidden Valley Road, Flower Mound TX. Everyone who submits a form will be recognized at the Spring District 2 Convention. I hope you will join me and the other District Clubs to make a commitment to establish or improve a habitat or to educate the public. Thank you in advance for your commitment to this worthy project.

1. The first step is an **awareness** of the problem. Your own observations and research of butterflies, bees, frogs and other wildlife will make you more informed and create a new attitude in yourself. You can then speak to others about the decreasing pollinator, amphibian and habitat problems.
2. The second step is to **understand**. What can I do? What are my options? Who can help? When you gain this type of understanding, then you can formulate a plan. Your plan can be as big or as small as you alone can do or what your garden club, school, neighborhood or community can accomplish.
The plan must include something which can be measured over time and results recorded. For example, for two weeks you can count the number of pollinators and amphibians you observe. Or add nectar plants to a garden plot and record changes you see. Or improve a wildlife habitat and take a before and after picture. Or count how many educational programs you present. Lots of ideas! Or create your own plan.
3. The third step is **action** - implement the plan, then watch for the expected results. It may take time, so patience is needed. Remember, change does not happen quickly.
4. The fourth step is to take the ***The Million Pollinator Garden Challenge*** and register your new or improved habitat on the S.H.A.R.E map. The Million Pollinator Garden Challenge is a NGC campaign to register a million public and private gardens and landscapes that support pollinators. It is easy to do and requires entering your name, location and marking your location on the S.H.A.R.E. map. When your site is registered, you will receive an email confirmation. 5. The last step is to **complete** the Director’s Commendation Award application. Every entry wins and receives a certificate that recognizes the Club or a member as someone who created or improved a habitat for butterflies, bees, frogs and other wildlife. Wouldn’t it be exciting if District 2 added or improved the most pollinator gardens within TGC and NGC! How proud would we be! 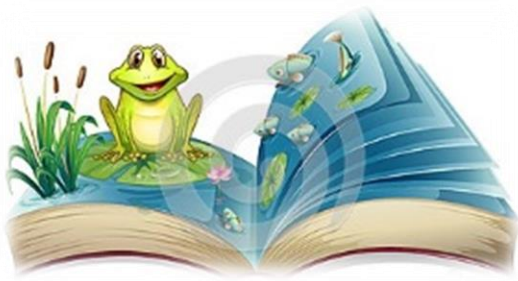
