#### Bulbs for fall planting 2013 - \$10 a bag (\$9 for GGC members)

- Spanish Bluebells (Hyacinthoides hispanica) One of the most adaptable bulbs, very shade tolerant, lovely bell-shaped flowers on 8"-12" stems; rich deep blue; naturalizes; heirloom 9 / bag
- **▼ Yellow Spider lily** (Lycoris Aurea) A yellow variety of our favorite red spider lily; 18"-24", blooms in the fall, with leaves emerging in the winter to very early spring 3 / bag
- **Snow Flake** (Leucojum aestivum) Critter proof, pendulous pure white bells; heirloom; naturalizes; 12"-18" mid to late spring − 9 / bag
- **Star Flower** (Ipheion uniflorum) Six petaled star-shaped, sweetly fragrant flowers with grasslike foliage; naturalizes; bright, deep blue 3"-6" stem, early to late spring 15 / bag
- **Quail** Quail floriferous with bronzy yellow flowers; 2-4 flowers per stem, 12"-14" stem; mid spring 9 / bag
- Daffodil Large cup Ice Follies Creamy white petals & a very broad 'wide-opened' cup matures to almost pure white; prolific multiplier; 1953 16"-18"; early to mid-spring 9 / bag
- **Byzantinus** (Gladiolus communis) Deep purplish flowers, 20"-24" stem; smaller flowered and hardier than their summer blooming cousins; late spring; heirloom 1700 15 / bag

Species tulip (Clusiana) – Excellent for rock gardens, front of borders; heirloom; will naturalize when happy; red and white - 15 / bag

#### **Senior Gardening Program**

The Grapevine Senior Activity Center is beginning a new monthly Gardening Program series. # **Butterfly Flutterby is moving to the Grapevine Botanical Gardens!**

Everyone is invited to celebrate the migration of the monarch butterfly from Canada to Mexico by way of Grapevine. The 16<sup>th</sup> Annual Butterfly Flutterby (BFFB) is a free, family-friendly event and this is the first year the event is being held at the Grapevine Botanical Gardens.

The event will be held **Saturday, October 19<sup>th</sup> from 10:00 A.M. – 2:00 P.M.**; the same day as the Grapevine Garden Club Native Plant and Tree Sale and the Nash Farm Fall Roundup. There will be three butterfly releases and of course a costume parade.

If you have never been to the BFFB parade, you will be amazed how many creative ways there are to dress children and their pets as butterflies. The parade will begin at the north end of Main Street and end in the Gardens. Prizes are awarded for the best costumes. Expected attendance is more than 3000.



Over the summer several Garden Club members have been working with Lisa Grove and the Convention and Visitors Bureau planning *lots* of fun activities and games for the entire family. Several members have already volunteered but we still need <u>your</u> help in the following areas.

**Grapevine Garden Club Art Contest** – This is the first time the Club has sponsored an Art Contest! The theme for the contest is "*Making the World Better and More Beautiful*". The contest will involve preschool and K-5 Grapevine Colleyville ISD students. Art Contest winners will be presented ribbons and cash prizes during the Festival. ### The Monarchs of Fall Saturday, September 28, 10:30 A.M. Grapevine Public Library

Do you know enough about monarch butterflies that you feel comfortable and enthusiastic while talking to visitors at the club's exhibit booth at the Butterfly Flutterby festival? Plan on attending the Monarchs of Fall program sponsored by GGC and presented by Jenny Singleton at the Grapevine Public Library! Join us as she brings information about these majestic insects and their incredible life cycle and how your landscape can help the monarch butterfly succeed in its journey.



Jenny Singleton, an educator, Monarch Watch volunteer, seasoned butterfly tag wrangler, and GGC member will present a program designed for both children and adults who want to learn about the beautiful monarch butterflies as they magically appear in north Texas each fall.



For the past twenty plus years, Jenny has been involved with an ongoing research program sponsored by Monarch Watch at the University of Kansas in Lawrence, involving monarch tagging. Monarchs tagged in Texas have been tracked by this unique numbering system to their overwintering grounds in central Mexico, thus helping scientists study their population. This is especially important today, as monarch butterfly populations are in a steady decline due to loss of habitat and the ongoing drought in their migratory path.

Jenny will teach you about the life cycle of this fascinating insect, its migratory patterns, and beneficial plants the monarchs depend on. She will provide simple backyard landscape ideas to help bring back the Monarch Butterfly—all of which will be helpful as you volunteer for Butterfly Flutterby and the Plant Native-Plant Now (GGC's fall plant sale) which will be featuring butterfly plants in addition to other native plants.

Consider traveling with garden club friends to visit unique art museums surrounded by elaborate gardens and landscapes. Guided tours are planned for gardens surrounding Crystal Bridges, Gilcrease Museum, and Philbrook Museum of Art. Self-guided tours are scheduled for many of the art collections. There is an option of a self-guided tour at the Philbrook or a docent-led tour of the Linnaeus Teaching Garden at the Tulsa Garden Center.

Tour expense fee of \$66.00, payable to Grapevine Garden Club, must be submitted prior to September 20 and covers the cost of guided garden tours, admission to Crystal Bridges, Gilcrease Museum, and Philbrook Museum of Art, lunches at Crystal Bridges and Philbrook, and miscellaneous tour expenses.

Anticipated expenses not covered by the \$66.00 fee would include hotel expenses, other lunch and dinner meals, and reimbursing carpool driver for gasoline.

There are currently twenty-one members and one guest planning to attend. The tour is limited to thirty. Tour folders will be distributed at the September general meeting to tour attendees.

Plant Native – Plant Now Sale Saturday October 19, 2013 – 9:00 A.M. – 1:00 P.M.

GGC is partnering with the City of Grapevine's Tree Sharing Program to conduct a plant sale on October  $19^{th}$  at the Grapevine Botanical Gardens. The event will be in conjunction with Butterfly Flutterby festivities which are scheduled at the gardens from 10:00 A.M. -2:00 P.M.

With the extreme drought and heat impacting our landscapes, better plant choices need to be considered, and fall is the best time for planting! You will be pleased to find that the *Plant Native – Plant Now* sale will feature native and adapted trees and shrubs that are hardy and not usually available at local nurseries. They will be small enough (one to three gallon) to transport in your vehicle and are

reasonably priced. In addition to the trees and shrubs, nectar and host plants for butterflies will also be featured.

To allow you time to consider your landscaping needs, a complete list of the plants for sale will be emailed to members prior to the sale. Members have come to expect a post-sale following our spring plant sales, but this will not be necessary following this sale since the City of Grapevine will purchase unsold plants to use in other projects. Gardeners love a bargain, and GGC members will be given a 10% discount during the plant sale. There will not be a pre-sale or special orders.

Grapevine residents may register for the Grapevine Tree Sharing Program during the sale. Sample trees will be available to view and order. Prices associated with the Grapevine Tree Sharing Program are very reasonable! The purchase of up to two 30-gallon trees includes delivery, planting and a six month – one time – warranty. Trees may be planted in the front or back yard following specific guidelines. Since many of our members are not Grapevine residents, GGC members in the following cities may participate at a higher but still great price: Bedford, Southlake, Colleyville, Euless, Trophy Club, Hurst, North Richland Hills, Coppell, Keller, and Westlake.

As you are aware, GGC, in cooperation with the Grapevine Parks and Recreation Department, would like to build a greenhouse at the Grapevine Botanical Gardens. We believe a greenhouse will provide opportunities to expand educational classes by creating a no-season growing environment. It will provide a living laboratory for hands-on lessons in plant propagation, floriculture, container gardening, fertilization, transplanting, and soil preparation.

The proceeds from the *Plant Native –Plant Now Sale* will be dedicated to the greenhouse fundraising campaign. Please support our efforts by attending, buying, and volunteering to assist during the sale.

# **Grapevine Garden Club Receives National Recognition**

During the National Garden Clubs (NGC) spring convention in Seattle, Washington the Grapevine Garden Club was awarded a National Award of Recognition. The award is for Conservation Education and is presented to gardening organizations who study conservation and the environment.



Thanks to Joetta King, Tour Director Extraordinaire, our members have many opportunities to tour public and private gardens in order to increase their awareness and knowledge of various conservation gardening techniques, design methods and creative use of plant material. Members may not realize that Joetta arranges our tours as *learning experiences* in conjunction with having fun and getting to know other Club members. (And you thought it was all about the food!)

The recognition was given specifically for our tour to the University of Texas at Arlington (UTA). Twenty-two members saw first-hand the design, construction and maintenance practices of two gardens. The **Green at College Park Garden** featured native and adapted plants that consume approximately 70% less water than a typical landscape for the area. The **Community Garden** is a cooperative project between the City of Arlington, UTA and Mission Arlington. It was a fun and informative tour. Thank you, Joetta, for all that you do for the Grapevine Garden Club.

#### Jacksboro Garden Club Plans Fall Convention

Jacksboro Garden Club will be "callin' in the Cavalry and hitchin' up the wagons" for a "rip roarin' good time" at the 2013 District II Garden Club Fall Convention! "Fall on the Frontier" will be held Saturday, November 9, 2013 in the Halliburton Building at Fort Richardson State Park, Jacksboro, Texas.

Registration will begin at 9:00 A.M., with the business meeting convening at 10:00 A.M. The registration form with all the details for the convention is included in this newsletter. Participants will enter through historic Fort Richardson and be transported across the prairie by horse drawn wagons! Attendees are urged to dress appropriately for the ride and enjoy the pristine surroundings of the fort grounds. Don't be surprised if you see some of the fort's deer grazing as you pass by.

Fort Richardson was established in November of 1867 as the northernmost fort in a line of forts ordered by the Federal Government after the Civil War. The forts were to offer protection to the settlers. It was abandoned a few years later and eventually became the property of the city of Jacksboro. Since being purchased by the State of Texas, seven of the original buildings have been restored and are available for tours. Hiking and biking trails along with camping and fishing have made Fort Richardson a popular "get away" for North Texans.

Other sites of interest in the area are the Jack County History Museum, the restored G.T. and W. Train Depot that houses the Jacksboro Chamber of Commerce, Twin Lakes Playground and Lost Creek Hiking Trail. 
