The Texas Garden Club (TGC) Spring Convention was held in El Paso a few weeks ago. At the convention, Kathy Cox was installed as the 2011-2013 TGC President and State Awards were presented to many garden

clubs. Polk County Garden Club in District III was named Garden Club of the Year. The runner up Garden Club of the Year was Hondo Garden Club in District VII. While the Award committee does not officially recognized the next runner up, I know from a good source, that Grapevine Garden Club came in third for Garden Club of the Year. Congratulations to both Polk County and Hondo Garden Clubs.

Also during the TGC convention, the Grapevine Botanical Gardens & Greenhouse project was approved by the incoming Executive Board of Texas Garden Clubs as a contributing project until 2013. That means garden clubs across the state can make donations through TGC to the Grapevine Botanical Gardens. In return for their donations, they will earn points on their clubs' rating reports. Ginger Jones, incoming District II President, made the presentation to the TGC Board. She said they were sincerely impressed with all the educational programs conducted at the Pewitt Pavilion and our docent tours. 



The Grapevine Garden Club had another successful year at the Flowercade Flower Show, held at the Fort Worth Botanic Garden. Flowercade consists of two divisions: Horticulture and Design. Thirteen GGC members participated in the Horticulture Division and won 23 first place ribbons, 17 second place, 3 third place and 1 honorable mention ribbon. Linda Krimm earned a green rosette "Arboreal" award for her Bird Of Paradise Bush sprig. Rachel Clark, who also served as the Chairman of the Horticultural Division, received an orange rosette "Award of Merit" for her bronze-leafed canna.





## FABULOUS FOLIAGE, cont.

A couple of years ago I created a foliage-only bed in my backyard. I'm not sure if that means I've finally "arrived" at some level of maturity in the world of gardening, or if I have just succumbed to the fact that my backyard is getting shadier and profuse blooms are no longer an option. Yes, some of those plants in my foliage-only garden do bloom, but their lovely leaves of varying shades, textures, and shapes are their main claim to fame.

I always tell my clients who are lamenting the fact that they can't have a riot of colorful blooms in their shady areas that they need to learn to embrace foliage plants. Don't get me wrong, I love blooms as much as anyone, but blooms can be fleeting. Foliage adds enduring interest, texture, contrast, and color. Some months we are hard-pressed to find any blooms in our gardens, but we can always count on foliage. When there is less completion from blooms, we can appreciate the foliage in our gardens all the more. The bottom line is that foliage plants give us a lot of "bang for our buck."

Spring foliage gives our gardens a fresh look, autumn leaves add color, and evergreen foliage adds structure and texture to our gardens through the winter.

Trees, shrubs, perennials, and groundcovers sporting foliage of lime green, dark green, gray green, burgundy, variegated, spotted or striped, add color to our gardens.

Differing textures (glossy, matt, fuzzy, smooth, crinkly, coarse, fine) and varied shapes (strapleaf/grassy, dissected, rounded) add interest and complement blooms.
